Dear Habitat Ambassador

The year 2020 will long be remembered in the history books.

The COVID-19 pandemic has dramatically and quickly altered lives around the planet with unprecedented social, political and economic implications. As individuals, families, and communities, we are trying our best to adapt to a rapidly changing world by implementing health measures to protect our loved ones and ourselves. Many are balancing remote work and schooling children from home. Still many more are unable to work from the safety of their homes, and many others are unexpectedly unemployed. All are trying to keep the flow of life somehow moving forward.

It is against this backdrop that over the past 3-4 months Hartford Area Habitat for Humanity has continued its mission of serving those in need within the communities we serve. While we curtailed our operations during this time, we considered home construction essential. By employing applicable safety precautions we were able to continue building projects already in progress. We did so with limited staff, without our usual volunteer workforce.

Because considerable uncertainty remains about the long-term impact of the pandemic, we adjusted our 2021 outlook accordingly. During the past few months, our CEO, Karraine Moody and the Habitat staff have done an excellent job navigating the COVID-19 challenges. We procured much appreciated Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding, built up our cash reserves, and employed strategic cost-cutting

Unfortunately, these past few months also have presented another great challenge for our country, which is not unprecedented. The tragic death of George Floyd once again highlighted the great struggle our country has faced when it comes to matters of race, equality, and justice.

In responding to the George Floyd tragedy, Habitat for Humanity International CEO, Jonathan Reckford and Adrienne Goolsby, Senior Vice President, U.S. and Canada, co-authored a letter to the Habitat community saying in part:

Habitat can be a vehicle for reconciliation. But it only happens if we make it so. Habitat is more than a housing nonprofit. It's a vision of a world where we share one humanity. Habitat for Humanity was born on a farm in South Georgia on the theory of racial inclusivity, at a time when inclusivity was seen by some as an existential threat. It's a vision of a world we still believe in and fight to build every day."

For just over 30 years, Hartford Area Habitat for Humanity has been working in the greater Hartford community to fulfill this mission. Please help us share that vision. Help us improve all the lives of the individuals and communities we serve.

Susan is the sister of Wendy Biggers, the generous donor who willed her home to Habitat. Susan shared that Wendy was a strong, independent woman who lost her battle to cancer in 2018. She said, "one of Wendy's final wishes was to give the house to Habitat for Humanity so another family could come in and love it as much as she did." Kim and her

son, Akeem, shared their appreciation by thanking Wendy for her legacy gift of a new home. In tearful joy she said, "We are so appreciative for her generosity and we will take very good care of this house."

CARES Act

As part of the government's response to COVID-19, Congress passed the Corona Virus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES). The purpose of this Act encourages charitable giving through tax provisions rewarding people who donate to charities.

2020 Incentives given through the CARES Act include:

- An above-the-line deduction that allows an individual who does not itemize to deduct up to \$300 of cash contributions to a qualified charity.
- Up from 60%, the deduction for cash contributions to a qualified charitable organization is increased to 100% of the individual's adjusted gross income.

• Up from 10%, the limitation for cash contributions from corporations to qualified charities increased to 25% of the corporation's taxable income.

Where Are They Now?

This photo haunts me. How are the Hartford area homeless families that once slept in these beds coping today? Where are they? Where is home?

WE NEED TO LEARN FROM THIS CRITICAL MOMENT ENGULFING OUR WORLD

On a freezing February 11, 2020, one of the 15 Tuesday nights from this past December through March that Hartford's Immanuel Congregational Church volunteered as an overflow shelter during the coldest months of the year, I paused to take this photo of the shelter's "bedroom." The photo's image has stuck in my mind ever since.

An Immanuel teammate and I had just set up Hartford Fire Department supplied cots in the church chapel, covering them neatly with fresh, clean sheets and pillows, and warm blankets. The converted chapel would sleep 12 members of homeless families that night. Where are they now? How are they? Where is home? In November 2019, with Hartford's citywide shelter system rightly anticipating being pushed beyond capacity, Immanuel Congregational Church leadership answered the city's call for help. It rallied 80 church members and friends to volunteer hosting an ad hoc shelter with the express purpose of serving overflow homeless families: parents, teenagers, and toddlers unable to secure shelter anywhere else in the Hartford.

Championed by church members Nancy Rion and Barbara Shaw (no relation), the Immanuel team was one of several Hartford faith communities committing one night a week during the winter to host homeless families. Its mission was to welcome, feed, and house stressed and confused families desperately seeking warmth, comfort, and nourishment. Homeless families swallow their pride moving from one place to another night after night, eating dinner with strangers, sleeping in crowded lodgings, accepting their surroundings silently, all the while tearfully hoping for a miracle. Their stories are complex, heartbreaking, and compelling.

With the current COVID-19 crisis mandates to stay home and maintain social distancing, the participating faith communities closed their volunteer shelters mid-March. Wreaking countrywide havoc, the pandemic is affecting our lives in ways never imagined. Thousands of individuals and families heretofore living within relatively stable and secure comfort now face the daunting, if not overwhelming, challenges of finding food, employment, childcare, housing, and healthcare. The homeless are even more vulnerable. So, what do we do?

We need to learn from this critical moment engulfing our world. We need to learn what's truly important in life. We need to learn the importance of dignity, equality, and respect. We need to learn to share our world's abundance. We need to learn the importance of healing healthcare for everyone. We need to learn how to help others help themselves. We need to recognize that everyone has a personal story of a real life filled with the hopes and dreams most of us share, and most of all to be accepted and pursue a purposeful life.

While I may be haunted by the photo of the empty beds, and thoughts of the safety and well being of the homeless we served, I believe we all need to step up and learn how to build a better world. How do we begin? Consider the words of my friend Rev. Dennis P. (Denny) Moon, Senior Minister, South Congregational Church of Granby: "Living in our society isn't just about individual rights, but also the common good. In order to understand the common good, you must enter into the suffering of others."
